### Governor Walker's Proposed FY 2018 Budget

The Governor's budget proposal is not good news for GGU employees and ASEA. Your Union, is already working to oppose privatization and to moderate to the greatest extent possible the overall reduction to departmental budgets and the number of our members that will be negatively impacted.

This is just the first step in the process of a FY 2018 budget being adopted. As you are aware, the Alaska Legislature will consider the Governor's proposed budget. It is impossible to predict what actions they may take or changes they will make.

ASEA will be communicating with the Legislature on a daily basis regarding the impact of the budget on our ability to provide needed services to the citizens of Alaska. Also, we are preparing to take every step available to us to overcome the Governor's recommendations on privatization.

The Governor's announcement of legislation to freeze Merit Steps and Pay Increments for all Exempt (EX) and Partially Exempt (PX) employees marks a regressive step in maintaining a quality State of Alaska workforce.

ASEA will strongly oppose the legislation even though it will have no immediate effect on GGU members. Merit Steps and Pay Increments are included in ASEA's current Collective Bargaining Agreement which doesn't expire until June 30, 2019. The State is required to honor Merit Steps and Pay Increments for GGU members until our current contract expires.

However, successfully opposing proposed legislation now is important so it won't be an issue when ASEA begins negotiation on a new Collective Bargaining Agreement in late 2018.

ASEA staff is currently developing materials and talking points that will be important for communicating with our elected officials, friends, and neighbors about the Governor's Budget proposal. Beginning in January we will be conducting worksite meetings to review with you the talking points and to assure you are fully informed on what the Union is doing to moderate the Governor's Budget proposal.

### Alaska's Next Legislature Features Coalition (

A significant outcome of the 2016 Primary and General elections is a new Majority organization in the Alaska State House, replacing decades of Republican party control over the chamber.

Twenty-two legislators—Republican, Democratic and Independent—allied themselves as a new caucus under Speaker of the House Rep. Bryce Edgmon, (D)-Dillingham and Majority Leader Rep. Chris Tuck, (D)-Anchorage. Rep. Louise Stutes, (R)-Kodiak will serve as the Majority Whip.

The new House Majority leadership also includes Rep. Gabrielle LeDoux, (R)-Anchorage as Chair of the House Rules

Committee and Reps. Paul Seaton, (R)-Homer and Neal Foster, (D)-Nome as Co-Chairs of the House Finance Committee. Rep. Les Gara, (D)-Anchorage will serve as Vice-Chair of the House Finance Committee.

In addition to assignments to the powerful Rules and Finance Committees, the coalition caucus has selected chairs, co-chairs, and vice-chairs for the remaining House committees from its membership.

More than 20 years have passed since the House was organized by a Majority other than a Republican caucus.

In comparison to recent legislative sessions, the State House will now be operated with a geographic balance instead of a bias toward roaded population centers.

The new Speaker of the House, Rep. Edgmon, hails from far-west Dillingham and is the first legislator of Alaska Native heritage to hold the position.

Moderate Republicans Reps. LeDoux, Seaton, and Stutes won their respective races against primary campaign challengers who were supported by their own party and joined the new coalition caucus to cement the majority. During the 29th Alaska Legislature, the three moderates—along with Rep. Jim Colver, (R)-Palmer and

Democrat Reps. Edgmon and Foster—were called the "Musk Ox Coalition."

In what has been called the "Musk Ox Revolt," these six legislators resisted the Republican House Majority plan to draw billions of dollars from Permanent Fund earnings to avoid negotiating a bi-partisan budget in 2015.

Colver wrote in an Aug. 2, 2016 op-ed piece for the Alaska Dispatch News that he was "one of two Republican legislators to vote against leadership's bill to put three legislators on the Alaska Gasline Development Corp. (ADGC) Board," citing a provision in the Alaska Constitution prohibiting Legislators from serving in another branch of government.

Rep. Colver earned the endorsement of the ASEA Political Action Committee for House District 9 ahead of the August primary, losing the contest to a party-backed challenger who went on to win the seat.

The ASEA PAC also endorsed, based on their political record and commitment to state services, each of the twenty-two incumbent I a w - m a k e r s a n d I e g i s I a t i v e new-incomers who now make up the house majority.
