The Credentials Committee met yesterday, Friday, March 18, 2022, to preliminarily certify a list of delegates and alternates. Of the seventy-eight (78) authorized Convention delegates from 21 Alaska ASEA chapters, the committee has preliminarily certified and registered forty-six (46) delegates, two (2) proxy delegates, and one (1) alternate.
